


Answering The Call is loosely based on the author's own experience of moving to Mexico to embark upon an adventure. The message is that women are vibrant, important, and beautiful at any age.


DISCUSSION QUESTIONS



Book Clubs and members of Senior Activity Centers will love Answering The Call. We hope to inspire and encourage older people to take risks – it's never too late to have the adventure of a lifetime!

- 1. Lauren Hillard sells everything and quits her job at seventy-years-old to move, alone, to a foreign country. While this might be laudable for those young, do you think it is unwise for those older to risk health and finances, when recovery would not be as easy, if at all?
- 2. David Escobar realizes that his former love interest is seventeen years younger than he the same number of years that Lauren, to whom he is strongly drawn, is older. Is there a validity to the perception that younger men dating much older women is farcical? Would you date a much older person?
- 3. Joaquin Macho Lopez, who profits in the gruesome organ trade, preys on the thousands of Latin Americans monthly tramping from South America illegally through Mexico to seek asylum in the United States from crushing poverty and horrific political repression. Is there a point where our United States government should draw the line from its infrastructure being decimated — in opposition to what Emma Lazarus penned, "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free." Do the words on the Statue of Liberty still ring true?
- 4. Renita, Lauren's psychotherapist daughter, seeks to confine Lauren on the basis that she is in the early stages of Alzheimer's. Lauren, now on the run in Mexico, fears for her sanity. Do you think Renita is acting out genuine concern for her mother, reacting from latent childhood anger over her mother's desertion of her addictive father, or enacting delusional traits symptomatic to her own mental health issue?


